WHAT IS HIV?

• HIV (human immunodeficiency virus) is a virus that attacks the body's immune system.

• If HIV is not treated, it can lead to AIDS (acquired immunodeficiency syndrome).

• There is currently no effective cure. With proper medical care, HIV can be controlled.

•People with HIV who get effective HIV treatment can live long, healthy lives and protect their partners.



1 in 6 Hispanics/Latinos with HIV do not know they have it.

HIV/AIDS IN OURCOMMUNITY

HIV continues to be a serious threat to the health of Hispanic/Latinx communities.

• In 2019 there were 973 new diagnoses of HIV reported in Ohio. Of these, 57 (6%) were among Hispanics/Latinx.

• In 2019 of the new HIV diagnoses among Hispanics/ Latinx in Ohio 86% were among males, and 14% were among females.

• In 2019 ages 20-34 years accounted for 61% of newly reported diagnoses of HIV among Hispanics/Latinx in Ohio.

PREVENTING THE SPREAD OF HIV

1. Get tested to know your status.

2. Use condoms, dental dams, or insertion condoms when engaging in sexual acts.

3. Discuss treatment options with your medical provider.
